Carbon neutral by 2030

We are on a trajectory to becoming a carbon-neutral Council by 2030 after the Council approved the [Carbon Action Plan](#) on 28th October.

This Plan reviews the carbon emissions associated with the operation of Council buildings, leisure centres and facilities and Council vehicle fleet, machinery and travel. Priorities for action have been set with a focus on reducing demand on natural resources and providing what energy the Council does need through low and zero carbon technologies.

Council has separately approved its Recovery Plan. Climate action has now received added stimulus in the shape of funding to support three new staff positions delivering both climate and ecological-specific project work. Building back greener is an embedded principal of the Council's recovery.



Climate action - your views

The results of our climate action survey have given us a really clear picture of how you are already tackling environmental issues and how you would like us to help you do more.



The response was tremendous, the equivalent to one in every 250 people who live in the District. An overwhelming 75% of respondents described climate change as a "high priority".

Your feedback also told us that you wanted to hear more about what the Council is doing for climate action and ways for you to get involved. We have taken these comments on board – this Seasonal Bulletin will be one way we will keep you connected and involved in local climate action. 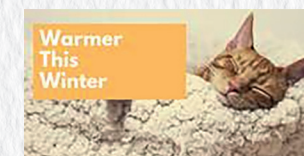
